FIRST READING: Isaiah 50:4-7 I did not cover my face against insult - I know I shall not be shamed

PSALM: Ps. 21:8-9. 17-20. 23-24. R.v2 R) My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

All who see me deride me.
They curl their lips, they toss their heads. 'He trusted in the Lord, let him save him; let him release him if this is his friend.' (R) Many dogs have surrounded me, a band of the wicked beset me. They tear holes in my hands and my feet. I can count every one of my bones. (R) They divide my clothing among them.
They cast lots for my robe.
O Lord, do not leave me alone,
my strength, make haste to help me! (R) I will tell of your name to my brethren I will tell of your name to my brethren and praise you where they are assembled. 'You who fear the Lord give him praise; all sons of Jacob, give him glory. Revere him, Israel's sons.' (R)

GOSPEL REFLECTION



For some time, Jesus had been trying to tell his followers that he was going to suffer and die, but they didn't get it, or maybe didn't want to get it. How could be that the Son of God could be treated so unjustly? Innocent suffering is incomprehensible and completely unjustifiable to our normal way of thinking, and yet the Father sent the Son to be an innocent victim, a lamb led to slaughter. When Jesus cries out, just before he gives up his spirit "My God, my God, why have you deserted me?" he reaches the most extreme moment of his suffering. He feels completely abandoned even by the Father, to whom he has always been obedient. But it was also in that moment that he fulfilled his mission on earth - to re-unite God and humankind. In our lives too, we experience sufferings of all sorts and we

try to make sense of them. Often we say "Why me?" That "Why me?" is a tiny replica of Jesus' cry from the cross. It is also a moment when we can enter into a deeper relationship with the Father.



THE SOCIAL DIMENSION OF EVANGELIZATION

REALITIES ARE MORE IMPORTANT THAN IDEAS

231. There also exists a constant tension between ideas and realities. Realities simply are, whereas ideas are worked out. There has to be continuous dialogue between the two, lest ideas become detached from realities. It is dangerous to dwell in the realm of words alone, of images and rhetoric. So a third principle comes into play: realities are greater than ideas. This calls for rejecting the various means of masking reality: angelic forms of purity, dictatorships of relativism, empty rhetoric, objectives more ideal than real, brands of ahistorical fundamentalism, ethical systems bereft of kindness, intellectual discourse bereft of wisdom.
